1. CURRENT SITUATION

Ransomware has become the largest cyber threat faced by the healthcare industry to date, especially during the pandemic, where hospitals are already strained and at a heightened operation tempo. Cyber threats account for at least 28% of targeted attacks on healthcare. An example of where ransomware occurs includes when criminals lock a hospital's cyber systems, such as patient and personnel records, and demand a ransom be paid to unlock the data. \$123 million was demanded and received from hospitals in return for access to patient records, and some have not been able to get information back even with after a ransom was paid.

Ransomware is detrimental in many ways, including delaying or entirely cancelling patient care due to locked out digital records as well as treatments. The main motivations appear to be medical identity theft, theft and sales of stolen information on the black market and unauthorized access to or theft of the patient's information. Additionally, thieves may be interested in stealing intellectual property or information pertaining to clinic or operational practices of the company. The reputational damage this kind of attack can cause can be extremely significant as patient trust is diminished and legal action may be taken, which could further impact the healthcare entity's financial standing.

Health care organizations and hospitals have not been known to have strong cybersecurity defenses, thus allowing criminals to exploit patient's safety by launching attacks. Ransomware often finds open hospital databases which allow the data to be leaked and then used against them. Often unprotected databases can be found on a local server and specialized equipment that is connected to the server, or these databases exist in SaaS or cloud-based platforms which may leave data exposed and visible.

Hospitals are often also unaware that their security controls may not be effective. Integrated third party software is one way criminals gain access without detection. Third party companies or software are frequently relied upon for tech support, billing or data reporting, and may also lead to further victimization should they be compromised. A due diligence assessment of these third parties is an additional safety measure that healthcare providers should consider.

Forbes reported¹ Thursday 25 February 2021, that hackers broke into the biochemical systems at one of the world's top biology labs, the Oxford University lab studying Covid-19. Forbes stated that, "A breach of the lab could place research data at risk of being stolen, including research into the coronavirus. There's also the threat of sabotaged research, if hackers were able to tinker with the flow of liquids or other aspects of the purification technology... Previously, Russian and North Korean hackers had been blamed for targeting Covid-19 researchers. But while some attacks on organizations studying Covid-19 have been linked to international espionage, the one suffered by Oxford University appears to have been the work of financially motivated criminals, though ones with alleged ties to government hackers."

It is worth noting that the Center for internet Security has launched a free ransomware protection service called Malicious Domain Blocking and Reporting (MDBR), for private hospitals in the USA. This service has already been available for public hospitals and health departments and organizations through the Multi-State Information Sharing and Analysis Center (MS-ISAC), for which funding is provided by the USA Department of Homeland Security.





2.2 COVID-19 World News

China did 'little' to hunt for Covid origins in early months, says WHO document

An internal WHO document shows that for eight months China did "little" when conducing an epidemiological investigation into the origins of the pandemic. A WHO team that met with Chinese officials in July, in a first meeting of the WHO mission studying the virus, was not provided with any documents or written date during its discussion with the officials. The US national security advisor called on China to make its public records from the early days of the pandemic available to all countries. In the recent January trip to China, the WHO team requested raw patient data of the 174 initial cases, of which half had an exposure to the seafood market the virus was first detected. However, the Chinese government has only provided the mission a summary of the patient data. China's lack of transparent cooperation with the world on the COVID-19 investigation does not provide it with a positive global view as the majority world is still grappling with the pandemic, if not seeing its worst. Furthermore, it is likely that the less truth is known about what has occurred, the worse it looks for China, despite its attempts at looking innocent and competent. Withholding information has only made the world take more guesses at what actually happened which could be worse than what truly occurred in China during the beginning of the pandemic.

2.3 Global Awareness

• The Indian vaccine giant expected to supply much of the world warns that it has been directed to put its country's needs ahead of exports

India produces about 60% of the world's supply of vaccinations and is currently undergoing one of the largest COVID-19 vaccination campaigns. Despite India being able to administer hundreds of millions of vaccinations in a year for disease such as measles and tuberculosis, they are struggling to inoculate Indians against COVID-19. Since mid-January, less than 1% of the Indian population has received its first innoculation and now the CEO of one the country's largest pharmaceutical companies, Serum Institute, is warning that countries that are relying on the company's supply may have to wait as they have been directed by the Indian government to ensure domestic supply orders are completed before export orders are filled. Serum Institute produces the AstraZeneca vaccine and will also produce the Novovax vaccine once approved. The company expects to produce hundreds of millions of AstraZeneca vaccines and over a billion of Novovax vaccine for COVAX, the global initiative providing low and middle-income countries with vaccines. Should low and middle-income countries not receive vaccinations at the same rate as richer countries, which are able to pay for them, it will make it difficult to end the pandemic.

2.4 Political Extremism, Civil Unrest and Activism

Russia beefs up fines for protest violations after Navalny rallies


Legislation was put forward by the Russian President Vladimir Putin, which increased fines for offences committed during street protests. This was as an action against the thousands who have been detained after attending protests in favor of Alexei Navalny, the Kremlin critic who was poised last year. The fines, previously sat at 1,000 Rubles, increased to 4,000 Rubles (\$54.30 US), and may also include a 15-day detention. Protest organizers were hit with higher fines, and Putin argues that the protests are by activists who are paid by foreign countries to bring instability and insecurity to the region. Russia has been known for assassinating or having their government's critics disappear, and Navalny's poisoning is a clear example of Russia's attempts at deterring its critics from speaking against the government.

• French farmers protest as food price talks reach crunch stage

Farmers have staged protests at supermarkets and distribution centres in parts of France, as they try to secure better prices for their produce. Their representatives are in talks with food giants while supermarkets are taking part in discussions over prices, under a law passed in 2018. Farmers say they are not earning enough to cover their costs, while retailers argue consumers cannot afford to pay more.



3.2 COVID-19 Canada News

- Variants will likely make up 40% of Ontario's COVID-19 cases by mid-March, modelling predicts
 Health modeling coming out of Ontario has shown that the public health measures have assisted in reducing the transmission of COVID-19. However, variants of concern such as the UK variants appear to be increasing and it is believed that soon, case numbers as well as hospitalization will soon be increasing. Vaccinations in long term care homes have assisted in decreasing the number of infections and deaths, and doctors predict the pandemic will recede again in the summer. Ontario's overall test positivity rate was at 3.1 percent, while Peel Region saw a 7.1 percent rate. If the variants of concern continue to spread, it is likely that by the second week of March the province will see 40% of its cases associated with the variants.

Those who refused were fined; however, it is unclear the price tag of the fine. Police also advised that they will not detain anybody for violating the Quarantine Act unless there are aggravating circumstances such as an offence under the Canadian Criminal Code.

3.3 Canada Awareness

• Canada's Trudeau, Cabinet abstain from China genocide vote

The Canadian government voted this week to declare China's treatment of the Uighurs as genocide. However, Justin Trudeau, as well as many of his cabinet abstained from the China vote. Last week, Trudeau advised that genocide was a "loaded term", despite using it previously to call Canada's treatment of the Murdered and Missing Indigenous Women and Girls as genocide. The vote also called for the International Olympic Committee to move the 2022 Winter Olympics away from Beijing. The vote is non-binding and cannot be actionable until work is completed together with international allies. The USA's previous administration had declared China's treatment its ethnic minorities as genocide and crimes against humanity, which was reiterated by the new administration. Since 2016, China has put over one million Muslim Uighurs and other minorities in indoctrination camps called "training camps", even naming Uighurs women as baby making machines. China advises that these camps were necessary from a national security perspective, and helped to reduce terrorism in its country. The international community must come together to ensure that China knows that its treatment of minority groups is not acceptable. Of interest, China has been elected to be on the UN Human Rights Council, where it gave a speech this week attempting to shift the definition of human rights to a one more suitable to the Chinese Community Party, which was "people' centered" and "on sense of people's gains, happiness and security".

 - USA President Biden and Canada's Prime Minister Trudeau held a bilateral meeting this week, where Biden promised that he will assist Canada in securing the release of the two Canadian Michaels; Michael Spavor and Michael Kovrig, both of whom have been arbitrarily detained in China. He advised that "Human beings are not bartering chips", and called for the release of the prisoners. The two leaders also spoke of the economic recovery from COVID-19, based on economic cooperation, and indicated they will be focused on a "inclusive recovery" as the pandemic did not affect everyone in an equal manner. No conversations were had regarding the cancellation of the Keystone XL Pipeline. As Canada's largest trading partner, a strong and cordial relationship between the two countries puts both in a stronger place than alone.

3.4 Canada – Political Extremism, Civil Unrest and Activism



During the week of 18-25 February 2021, the majority of activist activity noted by Welund in Canada took place in the government sector (48%), followed by oil and gas (13%) and mining (10%). Protests made up the majority of activity (34%), followed by critical commentary (13%).

Activist activity in Canada saw an increase this week. A reprieve from the extreme cold weather in Western Canada coupled with key upcoming dates surrounding infrastructure projects perpetuated a growth in activity, especially against the Trans Mountain pipeline expansion (TMX) project. Targets included construction sites and insurance providers for the pipeline.




Anti-lockdown protesters executed weekly marches in most major cities and townships across Canada. Despite the majority of provinces announcing a 'reopen' strategy, campaigners continued to organize large-scale marches to demand an immediate end to covid-19 public health restrictions.

Protests: Anti-TMX groups held a series of protests in BC. Four Indigenous activists with Braided Warriors were arrested in Vancouver after a protest at the downtown office of AIG Insurance. Video of the incident allegedly showed Vancouver Police officers forcibly removing the protesters from the site, which led to a cohort of activist groups condemning the actions of law enforcement during the 'Braided Rally Arrests'.

Additionally, activists in Burnaby, BC continued to occupy a 'tree sit' and oppose further construction along the proposed route for the TMX. A 'tree spike' action was executed, in which activists targeted trees scheduled to be cut in preparation for pipeline construction.

Beyond weekly anti-lockdown marches regularly scheduled in Toronto, Calgary, Edmonton, and Vancouver, approximately 100 activists in Winnipeg executed a march and protest at the Canadian Museum of Human Rights. Organizers claimed the march was to raise awareness for 'mental health', a problem the group argued has been exacerbated by lockdown measures. A similar protest was held at Parliament Hill by approximately 200 activists who argued lockdowns violated their Charter rights. Outlook:

Anti-TMX campaigns will likely continue with regular activity, especially following the 'Braided Rally Arrests'. The situation has also been exacerbated by a recent oil tanker spill in the Burrard Inlet. Campaigners will also likely continue targeting financial institutions and insurance providers, as the pipeline is scheduled for renewals on its loan and insurance coverage in March 2021. Campaigners have also stated they will support activists who have been arrested during protests or direct actions against the project at their scheduled court appearances. Anti-lockdown protesters have scheduled a 'super rally' in Calgary on 27 February, with a second confirmed event in Edmonton. We Are All Essential has made a nation-wide call for marches to support small businesses on 1 March. Other upcoming actions include marches and protests in solidarity with those opposing the forestry industry and climate change.






Figure 1 Total activist activity in Canada as noted by Welund.




Figure 2 Activist activity in Canada by type as noted by Welund








Figure 3 Activist activity in Canada by sector as noted by Welund.

4.2 COVID-19 USA News

• FDA says Johnson & Johnson Covid-19 vaccine meets requirements for emergency use authorization

This week, the US Food and Drug Administration stated that the requirements for the emergency use authorization for the Johnson & Johnson COVID-19 vaccine have been met. It found that after 14 days of the single dose vaccination, that it is 66.9% effective, while being at least 66.1% effective after 28 days of the jab. This vaccine appears to have better efficacy against the South African variant than thought before, with a 64% efficacy rate. In South Africa, where almost 95% of cases are now of the South African variant, and may be more fitting for that specific region. In the USA, it had an efficacy rate of 72% while Brazil saw a 68% efficacy against mild to severe disease. For severe disease, the protection increased to over 80% in those areas. As most cases of COVID-19 are spread by individuals who are asymptomatic, it appears that the vaccine also protects against asymptomatic infection and transmission, which will likely have a strong effect on reduction of new cases. Furthermore, side effects reported including pain at the injection site, headache, fatigue and muscles pains. However, some incidents to blood clotting and ringing in the ears have also been found in those who received the vaccine, in comparison to those that didn't. This will require further investigation but does not appear to be severe. It is of outmost importance to ensure that the vaccinations may assist against the surge of cases that may occur due to the variants, which only makes quick vaccination campaigns even more important.

• Nursing Homes, Once Hotspots, Far Outpace U.S. in Covid Declines

American nursing homes have begun their vaccination campaigns in the middle of December, with almost 4.5 million staff and residents of USA long term care homes and nursing homes having received at least one dose of the vaccine. Throughout the pandemic, over 35% of the deaths in the USA have been linked to care homes,



which accounts for only 1% of the USA population. From late December to early February, nursing home cases fell by 80%, doubling the improvement rate of the general population. Deaths at long term care homes have also decreased by 65%. Fun and entertainment has returned to some nursing homes, with many homes are now allowing visits with loved ones, and are even allowing residents to sing in choirs, although they are spaced apart and masked.

- The National Retail Federation (NRF) released a report suggesting that this year, USA retail sales may increase by as much as 8.2%, to over \$4.33 trillion. As vaccinations increase and people slowly return to normal, the economy is expected to see its fastest growth in over two decades. The NRF also believes that the economy may gave between 220,000 to 300,000 jobs for every month in 2021. It is believed individuals will begin to feel more comfortable to venture into public spaces including retail stores, but will still continue to purchase online, with online sales expected to increase around 20%. It is hoped that the new round of stimulus spending, with cheques of \$1,400 sent to households will drive consumers to purchases, sending people of all

• Drug supply chain issues aren't going away, report says

According to a survey of American pharmacists, it is believed that global issues including pandemics, climate change or trade restrictions may cause a significant threat for drug supply chains. Furthermore, almost 90% say that a technological failure of breach may cause widespread disruption in the delivery of healthcare supplies. Overall, it is difficult to produce all medication required in the USA, with imported prescription drugs having much cheaper prices. Additionally, the USA is reportedly the number one country for spending on brand name drugs, which make up most of the country's \$450 billion annual prescription bill. A reduction in spending on brand name drugs can be completed by approving more overseas manufacturers of generic versions of the same drug. It is likely that countries like Canada and the USA will have to rely on the importing medication as they do not have the ability to produce all the materials, nor the infrastructure to produce such large numbers of medications.

Biden CIA nominee Burns calls China an 'authoritarian adversary'

President Biden's nominee for the Director of the CIA, Williams Burns, said in a Senate committee hearing that a key to USA National Security includes countering the "adversarial, predatory" and "authoritarian" leadership of the Chinese government, who he saw in competition with the USA. He noted that China is becoming stronger in its ability to steal intellectual property, be able to oppress its people with new laws and technological advances and is slowly expanding its reach and influence over the USA. Burns is to be confirmed as the Director of the CIA after the hearings, with a vote by the Senate Intelligence Committee in the upcoming two weeks which will allow time for members to send more questions to decide whether he is a fitting nominee. When asked about his top four priorities, he advised they are "people, partnership, China and Technology". He further states that the Biden administration will produce an assessment of issues related to



Russia, and believes that North Korea and Iran are threat actors. With climate change, global health issues and cyber security issues, he advised that China's leadership poses the largest geopolitical test.

4.4 USA - Political Extremism, Civil Unrest and Activism (Provided by Welund)



During the week of 18-25 February 2021, the majority of activist activity in the US noted by Welund took place in the government sector (33%), followed by technology (27%) and oil and gas (11%). Protests made up most activity (52%), followed by meeting/gatherings (7%).


Since the widespread power outages caused by cold arctic weather in Texas, Louisiana, Oklahoma, Mississippi and Arkansas, environmental, climate change, and social justice campaigners have criticized the current system of private utilities, the independent grid in Texas run by the Electric Reliability Council of Texas (ERCOT), and the state and local politicians for the handling of the situation. According to activists, the outages were the result of climate change, and had compounded the economic and public health crisis related to the pandemic.

Stop the Money Pipeline (STMP) coalition has been active in its 'defund Line 3' campaign targeting the financial institutions invested in Enbridge and the Line 3 pipeline. The campaign outlined the multi-week divestment campaign against financial institutions (JPMorgan Chase, Citi, Bank of America, TD Bank, and Union Bank/MUFG were identified as the primary targets).

Protests: Despite the pandemic, activists continue to organize inperson protests to broadcast their campaigns and demands. Many organizers have incorporated physical distancing and mask-wearing adaptations to limit the risk of gathering for protests. California, Massachusetts and Washington saw the most protests this week.

There has been continued opposition, direct actions, and protests against Enbridge's Line 3 in Minnesota. On 24 February, anti-Line 3 activists blockaded Enbridge Line 3 worksites in the Savannah State Forest. Activists

locked-on to a flipped over vehicle, and another activist ascended a nearly 40ft bi-pod. There has also been several anti-Line 3 solidarity actions and protests across the US. Complete details on upcoming protests as of 25 February 2021 can be requested <u>here</u>.



Outlook: Welund continues to monitor covid-19 cases across the US for indications that additional lockdown measures amid a spring wave caused by new variants may inspire protests and demonstrations, and how the vaccine rollout will affect in-person protests. Members of the QAnon conspiracy believe Donald Trump will resume the presidency on 4 March 2021. 4 March has historically been a popular date to hold pro-Trump March 4 Trump events as well as counter-protests in the US. On 6 March 2021, Full-Stop Affinity, a "youth liberation anarchist environmentalist affinity group that organizes under the Green Anti-capitalist Front and the Youth Liberation Front," has called for an "autonomous day of action against the state" in the US. FSA has promoted tactics that seek to create 'chaos' to address climate change rather than relying on protests such as marches and youth strikes. Minnesota authorities are preparing for the

Black Lives Matter anniversaries – such as the death of Breonna Taylor, along with George Floyd's death (25 May), and Juneteenth (19 June) – provide activists with an opportunity to renew their demands, raise awareness, and issue calls for action. Calls for coordinated action on the anniversary death of Breonna Taylor raise the risk of solidarity protests in major metropolitan

murder trial of ex-Minneapolis cop Derek Chauvin in George Floyd's death in Hennepin County. On 8 March 2021, the trial will begin with selection and opening arguments scheduled to begin no earlier than 29 March. The trial is expected to last two to four weeks. On 13 March 2021, Seattle Black Anarcho Coalition has called for a day of action to commemorate the anniversary of the death of Breonna Taylor who was killed by police in Louisville, Kentucky in 2020.




Figure 4 Total activist activity in the US as noted by Welund.






Figure 5 Activist activity in the US by industry as noted by Welund




Figure 6 Activist activity in the US by type as noted by Welund.
