2. INSIGHT and SITUATIONAL AWARENESS

We are getting more and more familiar with COVID-19 as its transmission and effects are being studied by numerous groups of scientists and new information is coming to light almost daily. This week, approximately 239 international scientists signed a letter posted in the journal Clinical Infectious Diseases which is urging the WHO to change its COVID-19 recommendations to reflect the virus's ability to be airborne. WHO recommendations advise that COVID-19 is spread via large droplets which fall to the ground and do not stay suspended in the air. However, research is findings that in the right indoor conditions the virus could stay aloft in the air and this might mean that indoor conditions may be riskier that initially thought. These suspended air particles could travel tens of meters suspended at about 1.5 meters above the floor.

The scientists recommend that sufficient ventilation is provided in public buildings that have reduced air recirculation with airborne infection controls such as local exhaust, germicidal ultraviolent rays, or high efficiency air filtration. Also, avoiding overcrowding in public buildings and on public transport will assist in the reduction of the spread. Mounting evidence suggests that large indoor gatherings can become 'superspreader' events. Better understanding of the virus' possible transmission is important, especially as more indoor arenas are opening to larger crowds in many places in North America.

In response, the WHO advised they are reviewing the information with their technical experts. Criticisms have been growing of the WHO, particularly in regard to the previous assertion made in June saying that asymptotic transmission is rare. WHO soon retracted the comment, suggesting that there is not enough research on the matter to make a conclusive decision. For many months, the WHO did not comment on mask-wearing and its benefits.

The WHO is viewing COVID-19 as influenza, whereas research is finding many differences between influenza and this coronavirus. Influenza typically causes symptoms within one to four days and COVID-19 symptoms appear as early as two days or late as 14 days after infection. COVID-19 has both a longer incubation period and a higher transmissibility factor than influenza. It causes blood clots, and in severe cases, causes lasting damage to the lungs, kidneys, heart and brain - factors not found in influenza. Various strains of COVID-19 have been found, with a mutation which occurred sometime in April. This is evident in the USA cases that came from the European strain rather than the original strain. This strain appears to be the dominant strain, possibly more infectious than the original, however, it may also be less lethal.

Reports coming from India suggest that an Indian government agency is ready to test and approve their own COVID-19 vaccine. A date of August 15, 2020 was released for the vaccine, which the Indian Academy of Science called "unreasonable and without precedent". Critics suggest that the timeline does not allow for proper clinical trials, including testing on humans. Meanwhile, Brazilian health officials approved clinical trials of a COVID-19 vaccine being developed by a Chinese company. This will include 9,000 volunteers in 12 different centers. Both Brazil and India are experiencing a difficult time dealing with the pandemic, with Brazil being the second most affected country after the US, with 1.5 million cases and over 53,000 dead. India has just surpassed Russia as the third most hit country where test areas are unable to keep up. As the world's most populous country, there are testing labs that service 30 million people. India remains a concern as the pandemic rapidly spreads through its







population. Similar to what is being observed in Brazil, the poverty areas in India have poor sanitation and hygiene which enhances the spread of the virus. With China and India in conflict along their shared border, tensions are high in the region.

A serious concern regarding the impact of the pandemic on the economic functionality in the USA, is that their will be additional unrest as the unemployed require medical care. Without having medical insurance, due to the loss of employment, and without receiving adequate financial assistance it is assessed that citizens will become desperate to care for their families. This desperation will increase criminal activity as those citizens seek a means to provide for their families. As witnessed recently, riots and looting can occur spontaneously and are unrelated to the event that may spark the unrest. The tension facing these people is slowly increasing and can be evidenced by protests and an alternative view of the pandemic being spread across social media. A disbelief that the virus is as dangerous as the government is professing. Unfortunately, this mind set is being adopted by a variety of groups and individuals that also have anti-government sentiment which further undermines efforts to control the virus.

It is assessed that there will be an increase in the unrest in the USA and will be backed by groups that already seek to undermine USA government authority. Disinformation campaigns by domestic groups which are backed or led by foreign state actors remains an issue for Homeland Security and all the defence and security agencies in the USA. The USA is fractured in that the information available cannot be vetted which leaves the interpretation of the information to the citizen, whose perspective reflects their own personal beliefs and needs. The narratives are so diverse that as the pandemic gains greater impact on the lives of those most susceptible a level of fear takes hold and alters how individuals react to their situations. These reactions correlate to the needs of the individual and are affected more when they can relate to others in similar situations. The group mentality forms and takes shape which can lead to uprisings, civil unrest, riots, and looting. These are the main concerns that many areas in the USA and other countries are facing.





- For the first time in many months ON reports no new COVID-19 deaths. Additionally, two Toronto hospitals do not have any COVID-19 patients in their ICU. At its peak, the province saw dozens of deaths per day, but are now encouraged by the numbers yet advise of a small increase in daily cases.
- A student from the USA flying to Halifax has been the cause of three infections in PEI, which has not seen a
 new daily case since April. The student ignored quarantine requirements and the connection was found later
 through one of the cases to whom he transmitted the virus. Other individuals failing to follow the quarantine
 rule have been fined in Ontario, including two Americans.
- BC reported six new deaths over the weekend; however, one was a previous death just now confirmed to be due to COVID-19. All the deaths involve long-term care home residents. Currently, BC has only 166 active cases with 16 people in the hospital and 2 in ICU. Health officials advise that most cases come from people returning from the USA or those who have come into contact with them.

- Within the first five days of July, the USA recorded 250,000 cases. In Texas, the Houston ICU reached 102% capacity, with hospitalizations increasing anywhere between 20% to 44%, depending on the region in the state. Overall, hospitalizations rose 38% over the previous week, with over 3,000 people admitted in one week. Health officials are warning that within the next ten days to two weeks the hospitals could be overwhelmed. Last Thursday, the Governor ordered residents in almost all counties to wear masks in public, effects of which we will likely not see for another few weeks.
- Florida is also seeing spikes in cases, with half of the total confirmed cases recorded in two weeks. The MiamiDade mayor announcing a shutdown beginning Wednesday of restaurants, gyms, party venues and short-term
 rentals. However, office buildings, stores, outdoor activities, summer camps, daycare services, and grooming
 services will stay open. Reports suggest that health authorities may not always perform contract tracing,
 although contact tracing may not be as effective with such large numbers of cases.
- People continue to fly across the USA, despite fears of catching COVID-19 while flying. The July 4 weekend saw 700,00 people fly on each of the days of the weekend, the most since mid-March. However, this is still only 28% of the numbers seen the previous year in the same weekend. Currently, US airlines are only operating at 46% of their usual capacity.






