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2. INSIGHT and SITUATIONAL AWARENESS

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The WHO warned this week that it is likely going to be a "lengthy" fight against the pandemic, with its current global risk level at "very high". The WHO stated that although vaccines may be an effective way to prevent people from infection, for now, there is no "silver bullet". Moreover, the WHO is concerned of crisis fatigue and that with time, people will have difficulty continuing to follow the measures, which are our new normal until further notice. The WHO is also intensifying its studies of the origins of the virus, which will hopefully provide greater understanding of the virus and help in finding an effective solution.

Although infection rates are continuing to increase in many countries, it is reported that people admitted to hospital ICUs are less likely to die it is noted that the rate decreased by a third less than at the beginning of the pandemic. A better understanding of the pathophysiology of the disease has allowed us to find better tools to improve patient care and outcome, including steroid and anti-viral medications. Additionally, it is believed that implementing these measures has reduced the exposure to the amount of viral particles, likely reducing the severity of the disease.

The virus was first believed to be respiratory, but studies have found that tissues for the virus could be located across the body, and damage can be made to other organs including the heart, kidneys, and brain. Drugs which have been originally manufactured for other disorders have been found to be somewhat effective for COVID-19, and the patient's overall safety does not need to be revisited. However, the interaction between the drug and the effects of the virus must be studied. An example may be hydroxycholoriquine, which was first thought to be an appropriate treatment but has instead been found to be unsafe due to its interaction with the heart. Successful COVID-19 treatments such as Remdesevir, an anti-viral which is administered intravenously and was manufactured by Gilead Sciences for Ebola and has been approved in Canada and the USA, has been found to be effective in extremely severe cases. Researchers in Israel have recently repurposed an erective dysfunction drug to assist with severe COVID-19 infections, with its intravenous injection version currently being clinically tested in five hospitals in the USA. The drug, Aviptadil, is a synthetic form of a vasoactive intestinal peptide (VIP), a chain of amino acids which are found in the body naturally and protest the lungs. The drug is also a potent anti-inflammatory and has reportedly assisted patients with improvement in blood oxygenation and reduction in inflammatory markers.


Improved treatments for those afflicted with COVID-19 will reduce the negative consequences of the virus until a vaccine is available. Vaccine efforts are underway, with a long road ahead as vaccine development is sometimes measured in decades, not years. Russia has released information suggesting that it will begin mass production of their COVID-19 vaccine, with several million doses produced per month; other than being sold for domestic use it is unclear which countries will buy the vaccine, which was produced in lightning speed without any non-Russian peer-review. As occurred during the polio pandemic, an unsafe vaccine only fuels distrust with medical authorities and reduces the chances of individuals agreeing to become vaccinated. As such, a vaccine distributed to the public





must be safe and sufficiently effective, otherwise it may swing the pendulum even further and cause the public to distrust health experts, the results of which could be catastrophic.



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- Although Quebec has been the most affected province in Canada, it has now allowed public gathering of up to 250 people. In comparison, Ontario's maximum is 100 people outdoors and 50 indoors. Monitoring such discrepancies between provinces will allow us to better understand how the virus is transmitted and whether allowing larger gatherings will increase the transmission of the virus.
- Blood tests conducted in Ontario suggest that about 1% of the population there has been exposed to the virus. This comes from approximately 7,000 blood tests conducted in June which found that 79 had COVID-19 antibodies, suggesting that up to 160,000 people in Ontario may have been exposed to the virus. In Toronto and eastern GTA, this number goes up to 1.5%, while only about 0.3% of individuals in Eastern Ontario had antibodies present.

- According to the California Governor, the state's new COVID-19 cases and hospitalizations are beginning to trend downward. The seven-day average of infections has dropped by 21% and hospitalizations are down 10%. The Governor has reminded residents that COVID-19 is not going away and that efforts should be maintained throughout the summer.
- Tropical Storm Isaias has contributed to the closure of several Florida COVID-19 testing facilities since July 31, reflecting a significant drop in new case numbers. Approximately 20,000 less tests are being conducted, and over the weekend, the positivity rate for those testing for COVID-19 dropped below 10% since the end of June. With hurricane season running until November, officials are preparing for more shelters than usual to facilitate social distancing.



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










14. APPENDIX B – Phase 1 to 3: Progression on Managing COVID-19 Pandemic
