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1. CURRENT SITUATION

The remains of 215 children have been found buried on the site of a former residential school in Kamloops, British Columbia. Chief Rosanne Casimir of the Tk'emlups te Secwépemc First Nation says in a news release that the remains were confirmed last weekend with the help of a ground-penetrating radar specialist. The Kamloops Indian Residential School, once the largest residential school in Canada with about 500 students at its peak, was operated by the Catholic Church from 1893 to 1969. The federal government took it over and ran it as a day school for almost a decade before it was closed in 1977.

Indigenous communities across Canada have renewed calls for the Roman Catholic Church to apologize for its role in residential schools that forcibly removed children from their homes stripping them of their culture, language and identity. The Bishop of the Diocese of Kamloops, Joseph Nguyen, issued a statement Friday, saying he was "heartbroken" and "horrified" by the news and offered his "deepest sympathy," but it stopped short of offering an apology.

Pamela Palmater, a professor and the chair in Indigenous governance at Ryerson University, said the Catholic Church is directly responsible for the many atrocities that happened in Canada. She said it is a "disgrace" that there has been no apology.




Figure 1.Residential school survivor Harriet Prince of Sagkeeng First Nation attends the Walk for Reconciliation in Vancouver on Sept. 24, 2017.

In 2008, the federal government, under Prime Minister Stephen Harper, issued a formal apology for the damage done by the residential school system. In 2017, Prime Minister Trudeau personally asked Pope Francis to apologize during a visit to the Vatican. In 2018, Pope Francis issued an apology for the "crimes" of the Catholic Church in Ireland, saying church officials regularly didn't respond with compassion to the many cases of abuse children and women suffered over the years. The same year, Pope Francis told Chilean victims of clerical sexual abuse, he was "part of the problem" and apologized for "grave errors" in the way the Catholic Church handled sex abuse cases in Chile.

In 2009, Pope Benedict has said he is sorry for the physical and sexual abuse and "deplorable" conduct at Catholic church-run Canadian residential schools. Chief Edward John of the Tlazten First Nations said he hoped the apology will help "many people move forward."

In 2020, Conservative leader O'Toole was criticized for his statement on residential schools saying "Let's learn from the bad mistakes and, in some (cases), tragic circumstances of our past. But when Egerton Ryerson was called in by Hector Langevin and people, it was meant to try and provide education," O'Toole said, referring to the creation of the residential school system. O'Toole then retracted his statement after a backlash saying, "In my comments to Ryerson [University] students, I said that the residential school system was intended to try and Page 2 of 20





'provide education.' It was not. The system was intended to remove children from the influence of their homes, families, traditions and cultures."

This week, Trudeau told the House of Commons that the children found in Kamloops and others who have "yet to be found in other places across the country, would have been grandparents or great-grandparents." "They would have been Elders, Knowledge Keepers and community leaders," he continued. "They are not, and that is the fault of Canada."

Trudeau said the children should have never been separated from their families and taken to the residential schools, where they suffered "terrible loneliness" and suffered "unthinkable abuse."

O'Toole on Monday responded to the discovery of the mass grave, urging Prime Minister Justin Trudeau to take "immediate action" and asking the government to accelerate the completion of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission's calls to actions that deal with missing children.

NDP Leader Jagmeet Singh is making a renewed push for the federal government to take concrete steps toward reconciliation with indigenous peoples, calling on Ottawa to drop a pair of federal court appeals he says represent a "belligerent" approach to justice for First Nations children. "It is not good enough to fly the flags at half-mast. It is not good enough for the federal government to just express words of condolences, particularly when they are still fighting indigenous kids in court." The Liberal government is appealing a Canadian Human Rights Tribunal ruling ordering Ottawa to pay \$40,000 each to some 50,000 First Nations children separated from their families by a chronically underfunded child-welfare system. It is also fighting a tribunal decision that widened the applicability of Jordan's Principle, a rule stating that when governments disagree about who is responsible for providing services to First Nations children, they must help a child in need first and argue over the bills later.



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<u>UK tightens borders and travel rules as variants spark new alarm</u>

Portugal was removed from the UK's green travel list on Tuesday, amid rising coronavirus cases and concern over a "Nepal mutation of the so-called Indian variant". It will join the amber list, meaning holidaymakers should not visit and returnees must isolate for 10 days. Seven nations - including Egypt, Costa Rica and Sri Lanka - will join the red list, with the toughest travel rules. The removal of Portugal means the green list will, from Tuesday, consist of: Australia, Brunei, the Falkland Islands, the Faroe Islands, Gibraltar, Iceland, Israel, New Zealand, Singapore, South Georgia and South Sandwich Islands and St Helena, Ascension and Tristan da Cunha.

Israel's Lapid set to unseat Netanyahu, form new government

A new governing coalition has been formed and is prepared to replace Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu, opposition leader Yair Lapid officially informed President Reuven Rivlin and Knesset Speaker Yariv Levin late Wednesday night. Yamina leader Naftali Bennett, Lapid and Ra'am (United Arab List) chairman Mansour Abbas signed an agreement at a meeting on Wednesday night at Ramat Gan's Kfar Hamaccabiah Hotel, in the first coalition deal ever signed by an Arab party.

A cargo ship on its way to Singapore caught fire off Sri Lanka and tons of chemicals were destroyed or spilled into the Indian Ocean as a result of the flaming containers. 
Thousands of Colombians took to the streets again on Wednesday amid a deadlock in talks between the government and leaders of anti-government protests that are stretching into their second month. Last week, the two sides reached a so-called pre-agreement, the details of which have not yet been released. But the committee later accused the government of backtracking and talks on Tuesday ended without further advances. The attorney general's office says 20 deaths linked directly to demonstrations have been reported to date, while Colombia's Human Rights Ombudsman said at least 42 people have been killed in the protests.

Ottawa ups fine to \$5,000 for travellers who refuse to quarantine in a hotel

Air passengers entering Canada who refuse to quarantine in a designated hotel will soon be subject to a \$5,000 fine. The fine increase follows a government advisory panel report issued last week which said Ottawa should scrap the hotel quarantine requirement and instead let people arrange their own quarantine. The panel said the hotel quarantine is flawed for a number of reasons, including that some travellers are choosing to bypass the rules and pay the current fine of up to \$3,000.

The number of Canadians testing positive for COVID-19 took another sharp dive Tuesday, plummeting below 2,000 new cases for the first time since last fall. The 1,638 new infections came as most provinces and territories recover from the crippling third wave of the pandemic, which saw infections and hospitalizations skyrocket over the spring. The new average marks a 71-per cent drop from the height of the third wave in April and is down 54 per cent from the average just two weeks ago, representing a dramatically steady fall from the spring peak. Nearly 58 per cent of the population has received at least one dose, while 5.68 per cent are fully vaccinated, according to the COVID-19 Vaccine Tracker. About one in five new shots in the last three days were second doses, compared to fewer than one in 10 in most of May.

In April, the airline and government agreed to a \$5.9 billion loan package that includes money to help refund passenger tickets, but also capped executive compensation at \$1 million until 12 months after the loan is fully repaid. Air Canada on Monday disclosed in its annual proxy circular to shareholders that it gave \$10 million in bonuses to people the investor document called instrumental to the airline's survival over the past year, as air travel plunged during the pandemic. In a lengthy comment Wednesday, Freeland said she was disappointed in how some businesses seem not to be behaving as responsible corporate citizens while receiving taxpayer-funded federal aid to survive the pandemic. In the House of Commons later, Prime Minister Justin Trudeau said the airline's executives needed to provide an explanation, as he was pressed by the Bloc Quebecois to make Air Canada claw back the compensation.

3.4 Canada – Political Extremism, Civil Unrest and Activism



Overview:

During the week of 27 May - 3 June 2021, the majority of activity in Canada noted by Welund focused on the government sector (56%), followed by forestry (17%). Protests made up the majority of actions

(40%), followed by critical commentary (15%) and webinars (12%).

Favorable weather and an increase in covid-19 vaccinations in Canada had a notable effect on activist activity. While most campaign groups remain wary of health and safety restrictions due to covid-19, in-person protesting has become more frequent over the past seven days. The announcement of reopening plans, including the gradual easement of restrictions in many jurisdictions has likely contributed to a notable plateau in anti-lockdown activism.

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Extractive resource opposition continued to be the focus over the past week. Additional arrests were made by the RCMP while enforcing against forestry blockades in BC. Anti-TMX activists also continued actions at Burnaby construction sites.

Protests:

On 1 June, multiple arrests were made at the Fairy Creek blockade and at solidarity actions in other municipalities in BC. The most recent round of arrests brought the overall total to 151 activists. In addition to the on-site arrests, four youth members of Extinction Rebellion West Kootenay were arrested in Castlegar during a <u>solidarity event</u>.

Anti-TMX activists celebrated a series of perceived victories after campaigners claimed they successfully caused two separate work stoppages at construction sites in Burnaby. The first occurred on 31 May after activists spotted a bird's nest in a tree scheduled for removal. The second stoppage, on 2 June, was caused by an in-person protest at the Brunette River construction site where activists sat in front of vehicles.

Indigenous rights solidarity campaigns increased this week after the bodies of 215 children were discovered at a former residential school in Kamloops, BC. Multiple groups executed 'shoe protests' during which 215+ pairs of children's shoes

were placed at government buildings or catholic churches. A solidarity action at Ryerson University resulted in the vandalism of the Egerton Ryerson monument on campus. Campaigners also started a new petition calling on the Federal government to investigate all former residential schools for additional mass graves.

Outlook:

Campaign groups have organized upcoming actions in solidarity with the Fairy Creek blockade. A solidarity protest has been organized in Vancouver on 5 June. Additionally, Extinction Rebellion has organized a protest on 12 June and a hunger strike on 13 June.

350 Vancouver will protest against TMX insurers on 18 June. This action is likely part of the week of action on 14-21 June organized by the Coast Protectors, which will also target insurers of the TMX project. Organizers explained that the actions will be a combination of in-person and online actions against Liberty Mutual, Chubb, AIG, and other insurance companies. Additional details are expected as the date for the week of action approaches.

Indigenous solidarity events are likely to continue in the near term, particularly in the lead-up to Canada Day on 1 July, a date traditionally popular with anti-colonial, 'land back', and 'Shutdown Canada' protesters. A 'Bring our Children Home' march will be held in Toronto on 6 June, following candlelight vigils and a sacred fire in the city on 4 and 5 June.

In addition to these upcoming campaigns, a third global 'White Lives Matter' event is scheduled on 5 June and a third 'Worldwide Rally for Freedom' anti-lockdown protest is still set to go ahead on 24 July.




Figure 3 Activist activity in Canada by type as noted by Welund

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



Figure 4 Activist activity in Canada by sector as noted by Welund.

<u>Biden administration suspends Trump-era oil and gas drilling leases in Arctic National Wildlife Refuge</u>
 The administration plans to further explore the environmental impacts of drilling in the fragile Alaskan region.
 The Arctic National Wildlife Refuge covers 19.3 million acres, about 1.6 million of which are coastal plains containing precious and highly fought over oil and gas resources. It's home to hundreds of thousands of





migrating polar bears, waterfowl and caribou — and it's warming twice as fast as any other region on the Earth due to climate change.

Overview:

During the week of 27 May – 3 June, the majority of activist activity in the US noted by Welund took place in the government sector (67%), followed by oil and gas (7%) and finance (65%). Protests

made up most activity (56%), followed by meetings/gatherings (9%), and marches (8%). There was a continued focus on shareholder meetings as meetings wrap up.

Protests:

As US vaccinations against covid-19 increase and society reopens, Welund's analysts have noted that activists are increasingly returning to in-person actions. Organizers continue to emphasize physical distancing and maskwearing adaptations to protests. New York, Minnesota, California, and Illinois saw the most protests this week.


The Stop the Money Pipeline (STMP) coalition called on supporters to deliver 'Greenwashing Awards' to JPMorgan Chase bank branches "across the country" from 31 May - 4 June. STMP affirmed that "our goal is to deliver 'Greenwashing Awards' to at least 150 branches."





Analysts noted continued pro-Israel and pro-Palestine protests across the US in relation to the conflict in the region. On 29 May, activists held a 'National March for Palestine' in Washington, DC to demand that President Joe Biden "sanction Israel now."

On 2 June, four activists were arrested for "blockading a Mountain Valley Pipeline (MVP) easement and equipment yard" near Pembroke, Virginia for "nearly seven hours." Four activists locked onto a "12' by 8' wooden duck," while displaying a banner that read: 'No Pipelines'.



Outlook:

Past (grey) and upcoming (red) protest activity as noted by Welund between 27 May- 9 June.

On 29 May, activists will hold a 'National March for Palestine' in Washington, DC to demand that President Joe Biden "sanction Israel now." Hundreds of protesters are expected to participate.

On 5-8 June, anti-Line 3 campaigners will attend the 'Treaty People Gathering' in northern Minnesota. Attendees will "gather in Northern Minnesota to put our bodies on the line, to stop construction and tell the world that the days of tar sands pipelines are over." Activists from across the US are organizing travel to attend the event.

On 5 June, White Lives Matter (WLM) organizers will hold another day of action after claiming a similar event on 8 May was a success.

On 11 June, anarchists will participate in the 'International Day of Solidarity with All Long-Term Anarchist Prisoners'. The annual event attracts interest from anarchists who engage in letter writing, meetings, protests and occasional vandalism.

Welund expects to see continued Black Lives Matter-related activism related to the anniversary of George Floyd's death through the weekend and leading up to Derek Chauvin's sentencing on 25 June.



Figure 5 Total activist activity in the US as noted by Welund.










Figure 6 Activist activity in the US by industry as noted by Welund




Figure 3 Activist activity in the US by type as noted by Welund.
